and support your child's thinking by asking these takehome questions:


- 1. What was the biggest challenge you faced today? (Ask your child and then have them ask the question back!)

RECEPTION TEAM UPDATE

LEARNINGL



This week in Reception we have been using our fantastic imaginations to plan and write our own 5 sentence stories. As a whole class we created a story about a soft, pink panda and a sticky slime monster! We thought hard about using adjectives to describe objects and characters in the story to make it more interesting.

In maths we have been exploring patterns. The children are developing their understanding and abilities to create their own patterns with objects within the provision. We have also learnt a new pattern based playground song called In and Out the Dusty Bluebells which the children have loved

We are really enjoying our music lessons at the moment too - this week we have learnt a new song called 'Alice the Camel'. We have discussed the pace and tempo of the music as well as the pitch.

UPDATES ON THIS WEEK'S 3 LEARNING

YEAR 1 TEAM UPDATE

In English, this week we have finished our English innovated story focused around stopping the villain. We have looked how we can make our endings much more exciting! They have done so well with using their descriptive and storytelling language!

In maths we have focused on more than and less than within groups and numbers. It has been hard remembering all this new vocabulary, but we are getting there. They have been all trying their best.

In computing we have had the iPads out again focusing on a new artist who creates circles based on different feelings. The children were able to have a go at creating their own piece of work based on the artist and focused on the different feelings. We linked this nicely with our zones of regulation colours.

In science we had so much fun focusing on our sense of smell. We used ours noses to guess what was in the cups. This will be revealed on Friday, so we are looking forward to finding out exactly what they were and whether we guessed them right.

In art we have continued creating spirals based on observational drawings of shells. The children were creating continuous line drawings which meant they were unable to remove their pencil. They came out so beautiful, it was definitely not too hard of a challenge.





We have continued to innovate our pirate stories this week into our books and tried to include adjectives and conjunctions to make our stories sound more interesting. We have recapped our Year 1 knowledge of nouns and verbs to help us with our innovations.

In maths we have continued to practise and rehearse our 2, 5 and 10 times table. This week we started to look at our 3 times table! Keep up the great work on TTRockStars as this is really benefitting the children's recall of these.

In history, we have focused the history of flight into our local area- Fradley. The children enjoyed learning about the significance of Fradley. I have attached a local walk on Tapestry that you could do with your child to recap on the key points of interest in Fradley related to the RAF base. The children were very engaged in this lesson!

We have continued to work on our vehicles of the future in D&T but we are yet to add our wheels! This will be our task next week...

In science, we conducted another experiment of how our heart rate changes when doing different activities. It was tricky at first to find our pulse but once we did we had a great time counting how many beats we could feel.

This week in Year 3, we have continued to learn about the Stone Age. We learnt about the 3 different eras of this time period: Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic, and thought about how life developed for the Stone Age people. We are really looking forward to making our own Stone Age tools in the next couple of weeks!

We have been thinking hard about how to be kind to others both in and out of the classroom. In PSHE, we have thought about what 'our dream school' would look like and how we can all play a part in making sure that school is a lovely place to be! In RE, we also talked about 'random acts of kindness' ...the children have enjoyed planning these ideas that they can enact both at school and at home!

In maths, we continued to learn about addition and subtraction. Thank you to the parents who attended the KS2 Parent Workshop where it was explained how maths is taught in KS2. Please look out for the slides on Tapestry.

I have also been extremely impressed by the children's writing in English lessons. We have finally written our own version of the fairytale 'Hansel and Gretel', which the children are all really proud of. Their presentation is really incredible and they have so many amazing ideas to share! We have a classroom full of budding authors!

SAFEGUARDING UPDATE




Important message from SCC (Staffordshire County Council) Safeguarding Team





WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Our guide looks at the risks surrounding EA Sports FC 26 and our top tips to minimise them. This marks the third year since EA left the FIFA licence, and the game is mostly unchanged from last year. While Kick-Off mode is great for playing with friends and Career Mode allows players to fulfil long-term ambitions as a manager or player, Ultimate Team remains the main draw for many players – and it can get out of hand in terms of how much money players can invest.

AN ANNUAL RELEASE SCHEDULE

As was the case with the last two EA Sports FC games and the FIFA series before it, the franchise rolls out once a year with updated squads and new features. This can make it expensive to keep up with, particularly when so many dedicated players are keen to get their hands on the latest edition.

VOICE CHAT

Voice chat can be enabled across all platforms, meaning young people can speak to anyone they play with or against. While it can be switched off, some children will no doubt want to speak to their friends while they play. This also means they may encounter strangers much older than them, which can expose them to inappropriate language or behaviours.

IN-GAME PURCHASES THROUGH ULTIMATE TEAM

Ultimate Team is the big draw for EA Sports FC, letting players spend real money on packs that they can open to build a squad of the world's best players. They're not always easy to obtain, and new, improved versions of players will be regularly added as limited-time offerings. Young people could feel preseured into spending money and experience fear of missing out.

SCAMMERS IN ULTIMATE TEAM

Ultimate Toam is managed by LA Itself, but that hosn't stopped scammers from looking to dupe players out of money and in-game coins. Some scammers sell their accounts, which is a violation of EA's terms of service, while others will 'self' coins - something the developer is still working to crack down on. Some try to gain access to others' accounts, potentially alving them access to payment information.

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

While EA Sports FC is potentially addictive, thanks to its fast-paced gameplay and mirroring of the real-world skill and glamour of football, Ultimate Fearn's focus on limited-time rewards and the lattery of winning packs can make it feel closer to gambling than gaming, which may lead to addiction and impulsive sending of money.

Advice for Parents & Educators

PREPARE FOR ANOTHER GAME IN A YEAR

The annual-release cadence aligns with the return of the school year, and can be a great way to incentivise good behaviour at the start of term. If children are applying themselves and preparing for a new year of school, or were particularly well behaved in the summer, EA Sports FC 26 could make a great reward.

LIMIT SPENDING

If you're worried about children accidentally spending real money in Ultimate Team, whether in game or on the EA Sports FC companion app, don't link a payment card to their account. Reclaiming funds can be a mountain to climb, and the deparaine hit of opening flashy packs with slick animations means one purchase can lead to another very quickly. It's also worth adding a prepaid card if you'd prefer them to make their own choices with their budget.

MONITOR VOICE CHAT

As in-game chat is open, be sure to adjust the settings in EA Sports FC 26 to lock it down. If children want to chat with their friends while they play, consider setting up a safe space for them to call, to allow them to play without fear of autsiders.

BE VIGILANT

As with last year, there are ways to keep scammers at bay. Ensure passwords are locked down, and consider using a password manager application to keep them secure. EA will never contact players through the game litself, so be vigiliant with incoming messages, and block and report suspected spam. EA will contact players by email if needed, but they will never ask for usernames or passwords. Players should also avoid buying in-game currency from unofficial websites – doing so can lead to accounts being banned and could cost players manay in the process.
